Bio. Linda Van Doren is the Director of Instruction at Emily Griffith Technical College, which is the postsecondary education arm of the Denver Public School System in Denver, CO. Linda has over 20 years of experience as a classroom teacher, curriculum developer, teacher trainer, and administrator, and has worked with English language learners, middle, secondary and postsecondary CTE students both in the US and abroad. She serves on multiple committees that support strong CTE and workforce education initiatives and alignment statewide and nationally. Linda is an active member of many professional organizations including the Colorado Association for Career and Technical Education (CACTE) and the Commission on Adult Basic Education (COABE). Linda has contributed to a Cambridge University Press writing textbook series, and has presented at regional and national conferences in the fields of career pathways, teacher education, instructional practice and programming, adult education, accreditation, change-readiness, process improvement, and strategy-building. Linda is a doctoral student in the Leadership for Educational Equity program at the University of Colorado, Denver, and her research area is on postsecondary CTE instructor credentialing in Colorado. She earned her Master's Degree in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages and her Bachelor's Degree in Near Eastern Languages and Literatures and Social Studies Education at New York University.

Project. Colorado has a tremendous need to hire qualified CTE teachers as the state struggles to fill its talent pipeline during this period of economic growth and historically low unemployment. Currently the state provides a pathway to teacher credentialing that has not been examined for its effectiveness in leading to desired outcomes. The study will examine Colorado's postsecondary CTE faculty credentialing process in partnership with the Colorado Community College System Office of Career and Technical Education.


