Bio. Jacob Kamer is a Research and Strategy Analyst at the Tennessee Higher Education Commission (THEC) and the Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation (TSAC). In his current role, he helps facilitate the production of THEC/TSAC’s annual statutory reporting, such as the Tennessee Higher Education Fact Book, and collaborates with internal and external stakeholders on research and data analysis.
